



Sydney Dominates New South Wales Residential Building Hotspots

Sydney remains the focal point of New South Wales' residential building Hotspots, according to a new report from the Housing Industry Association (HIA).

The *HIA – JELD-WEN Population and Residential Building Hotspots* report provides a snapshot of Australia's fastest growing metropolitan and regional areas in the 2009/10 financial year.

A "Hotspot" is defined as a local area where the rate of population growth rate exceeds the national rate and the value of residential building work approved is in excess of \$100 million.

New South Wales registered fourteen individual Hotspots in 2009/10 – a dramatic improvement on the six Hotspots recorded in 2008/09. Of the fourteen Hotspots, ten were located in the Greater Sydney region.

Canada Bay – Concord led the way for NSW for a second year running. Population growth in this area was 5.7 per cent - well above the national rate of 1.7 per cent. The value of residential building work approved was nearly \$290 million.

Blacktown – North was the second ranked Hotspot in NSW. Population growth in this area was 4.5 per cent, and the value of residential building work approved was an impressive \$228 million.

Camden ranked third with a population growth rate of 2.9 per cent and a total value of residential building work approved of \$125 million.

Outside of Sydney, Hotspots emerged in Tamworth Regional – Part A (Northern), Maitland (Hunter), and Cessnock (Hunter).

"It's pleasing to see that New South Wales registered a healthy number of fourteen residential building Hotspots in 2009/10. Much of this resulted from the unprecedented stimulus to new home building in the form of record low interest rates and the first home owners grant for new dwellings," said HIA NSW Executive Director, David Bare.

"The new State Government now has the challenging task of creating an environment for housing to grow and prosper without the short-term stimulus provided to combat the GFC. NSW must return to having a strong overall economic position with a strong housing industry," added Mr Bare.
